

In addition, she won the Plenary Presentation at ATC Young Investigator Award.

Dr. Alexis Colley graduated this month from her UCSF Hospice and Palliative Medicine Fellowship training program. This program trains top physicians in a fully transdisciplinary environment to become compassionate, clinically excellent leaders in all areas of Hospice and Palliative Medicine.

This simulator received excellent feedback from second-year residents. Dr. Cowan plans to refine the model and curriculum further, significantly improving surgical training and patient safety.

Her presentation titled "Laparoscopic, Spleen-Preserving Radical Antegrade Modular Pancreatectomy with ICG Imaging for PDAC" secured Second Place in the Top 10 Residents/Fellows Best Presentation Competition at the SAGES 2024 Annual Meeting.

"Did you hear that UCSF Health reached a major milestone with our 15,000th robotically assisted surgery?

Gastrointestinal cancer surgeons at the UC San Francisco have performed the health system's 15,000th robotically assisted minimally invasive surgery, making it the first University of California health center to reach this milestone. UCSF Health has the busiest robotic surgery program in the UC health system and is the leading academic medical institution for robotic surgeries in the western U.S.

The milestone surgery was a robotically assisted duodenal resection performed by Dr. Mohamed Adam, a UCSF Hepato-Pancreato-Biliary Cancer Surgeon who specializes in using minimally invasive robotic techniques. The patient was a woman with a gastrointestinal stromal tumor and Dr. Adam performed the surgery with the da Vinci Surgical System, in use for many robotic procedures at UCSF.




